Peter van de Graaff Program Director and Music Host Beethoven Network

Peter van de Graaff is recognized nationwide as a leader in classical music broadcasting. After beginning his radio career in 1984 at KBYU, he came to 98.7 WFMT as a staff announcer in 1988, and now works at KWAX in Eugene, Oregon. For the past 25+ years he has been the host of the Beethoven Network, a nationally syndicated daily program carried on stations around the country. Since 1996 he has been the program director of the service as well. He has also hosted such nationwide broadcast series as Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra, the Van Cliburn Piano Series, operas from the European Broadcasting Union, the Lyric



Opera of Chicago, Music of the Baroque, and the Vermeer Quartet.

In addition to his distinguished career in media, Peter has sung to great acclaim throughout the world. He performed and recorded a Mass by Jan Vorisek with the Czech State Symphony under Paul Freeman and has also sung Beethoven's *Missa Solemnis* throughout the Czech Republic and Poland with the Czech Philharmonic. He appeared in Berlin with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in Schoenberg's *Moses und Aaron*. In Budapest he sang with the Budapest Concert Orchestra in Verdi's *Requiem*, in Tel Aviv, the Israeli Chamber Orchestra joined him in a Mozart Mass, and he has appeared in Tokyo as a recitalist.

His singing has also taken him throughout the United States, where his appearances include engagements with the Houston Symphony, Chicago Symphony, Utah Symphony, San Antonio Symphony, Syracuse Symphony, Louisiana Philharmonic, Omaha Symphony, Wichita Symphony, Colorado Springs Symphony, Richmond Symphony and many others.

Peter has a great interest in languages and speaks Dutch, German and French, with additional study in Italian, Spanish and Russian.

In 2010, Peter van de Graaff was the sixth recipient of the Karl Haas Prize for Music Education, joining fellow recipients Michael Tilson Thomas, Peter Schickele, Martin Bookspan, Howard Goodall, and Christopher O'Riley.

Programming Philosophy

At the Beethoven Network, we go far beyond just playing random pieces of music. Our philosophy and goal is to take the listeners on a musical journey, so we tie pieces of music together in interesting and novel ways. Whether it is to illuminate what has just been heard or to start down a completely different path, the music selected is always played for a purpose. We take great time and care in putting every hour together in thoughtful ways.

We never fade in or out of music. Generally speaking, we don't play single movements of compositions. Exceptions to this may include a ballet, opera or orchestral suite.

We believe in playing the "core repertoire" in abundance, but we also delve into the lesser known works and composers, drawing on our extensive collection of thousands of recordings.

We limit vocal music primarily to the occasional 2:00 or 6:00 breaks, but if there is a compelling reason to play something vocal that ties in with a theme we are developing, we won't hesitate to play it. That would be an exception, however, as instrumental compositions by far dominate.

Avant-garde music is avoided, as is, with rare exception, organ music.

In announcing the selections, the focus is on the music—not on the host. Our goal is to be welcoming and congenial without drawing attention away from the music. Talk is kept to a minimum, but if there is something interesting or illuminating to say, we won't hesitate to say it.

At the Beethoven Network, we maintain time-tested standards of quality to bring you distinguished programming and a consistently engaging listening experience.





Beethoven Network: Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Who is the host?

A: The host of the Beethoven Network is Peter van de Graaff, whose beloved presence on the service has been enjoyed by radio audiences for over 3 decades. You can read more about Peter online by navigating to the <u>Beethoven Network program page</u> on our website.

Q: What style of classical music do you play?

A: Peter's programming approach for the Beethoven Network ties pieces of music together in interesting and novel ways. Whether it is to illuminate what has just been heard or to start down a completely different path, the music selected is always played for a purpose. There is a focus on playing core repertoire, with occasional lesser known works and composers. You can always browse the <u>Beethoven</u> Network playlist online to see the depth and variety of musical selections.

O: How much does the Beethoven Network cost?

A: The Beethoven Network is priced on a sliding scale where the more hours you take, the cheaper it is per hour. We are always happy to provide official or unofficial quotes, and interested stations are welcome to provide a few different schedule scenarios to get a sense of cost. When determining price, we also take into account a station's specific circumstances (such as budget size, new station rates, funding situation, rate matching, etc.) in order to come up with the best solution for both parties. Don't hesitate to get in touch if you'd like to find out what the Beethoven Network might cost for your station!

Q: Do you offer reduced rates for HD-only broadcasts?

A: Yes we do! HD rates for a station are determined with a number of factors (including circumstances mentioned above), but are priced at a fraction of the usual FM rates. Stations taking the Beethoven Network for their FM signal are also allowed to use those same hours on their HD bands at no extra charge.

Q: Is it possible to have Peter record custom liners, promos, etc.?

A: Absolutely! Peter is always happy to voice promos, liners, shout-outs, pledge drive hand-offs, and more. Simply send the copy that you would like voiced and a timeline to <u>Estlin Usher</u>. Once recorded, we will send the files to you via our FTP or any other online file delivery service.

O: What is PRX?

A: PRX (the Public Radio eXchange) is an internet-based file delivery system designed to be an easy and flexible way for stations to receive programs. All of our series and specials are distributed on PRX, and the vast majority of stations use the SubAuto system to automatically send and ingest the programs into your schedule. PRX is free for WFMT Radio Network stations, and we have both a staff member on hand to help answer technical questions. We also have a short line to PRX staff in the rare occasion that there are questions we can't answer, ensuring that any issues are taken care of quickly and efficiently.

O: What is SubAuto?

A: SubAuto is the automatic distribution system on PRX that allows for a regularly scheduled delivery. The system asks for some technical information for your station, and once set up, the program files are automatically sent to an FTP according to your schedule with defined Cut Number IDs for each segment of each hour and day. Each Cut Number ID remains consistent from week to week, so you always have the same cut number for, say, Hour 0 on Mondays. This allows the files to be automatically ingested into your automation system, and once set up, will populate each day like clockwork! We are always happy to help answer any questions you may have, so please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Q: I need to cover more than 9 hours per day. What are my options?

A: We allow repeats of hours on a by-request basis. Many stations have come to us in the past few years looking to fill a 24-hour broadcast schedule for HD channels, and the Beethoven Network can be an efficient and cost-effective solution. Stations airing the hours on a 24-hour cycle will frequently air all 9 hours, followed by repeating those same hours in a different order (to break hour-on-hour habituation). We also offer reduced or waived fees for our weekly series programming in these cases, to provide listeners with some variety.

Q: Is it possible to bundle Beethoven Network and Jazz Network, or other programs?

A: Absolutely! As a mission-driven, non-profit organization dedicated to supporting and celebrating classical, jazz, folk, and more, we are always willing to work with you to bring these wonderful art forms to your listeners. We frequently bundle programs, offer deferred rates, and work out deals with stations that meet both of our needs. When in doubt, just reach out! We're here to be of service to you.

broadcast host for over 100 radiothons for some 26 different orchestras. The radiothon concept has raised in total over \$60 million for orchestras on this continent since Mr. Fogel started the concept in 1968.

He and his wife Frances have a son, Karl, and a daughter, Holly, and four grandchildren.

Samuel Barber was only 28 years old when Arturo Toscanini premiered his *Adagio for Strings* in 1938 with the NBC Symphony Orchestra. He was an overnight success and became the most performed composer in the United States: His music is mostly unaffected by the modern tendencies of his time – he was out of step during the first half of the 20th century. Samuel Barber was as much a cosmopolitan as a romantic lyricist, and his writing unmistakably has its fixed stars: Bach, Brahms, and Fauré. We'll explore his world, life, and music in this week's program and finally face the inevitable question: A huge success at such a young age – a blessing or a curse?

Dee Alexander, John Hill, Dave Schwan, and Leslie Keros

Dee Alexander

Dee Alexander is one of Chicago's most gifted and respected vocalists/songwriters. Her musical interests span virtually every genre, especially those related to the African diaspora, including Gospel, R&B, Blues, Neo-soul and other musical forms. Her true heart and soul though, are ultimately expressed in their purest form through her explorations in Jazz, the one idiom that can encompass all her interests and influences. Ms. Alexander gravitated toward this musical form at an early age. She names Sarah Vaughan, Billie



Holiday, Nina Simone and Ella Fitzgerald among her many major influences. Chicago saxophonist "Light" Henry Huff, as well, profoundly influenced her by encouraging the taking of risks and the crossing of boundaries, setting her on a path to emerge as one of the most celebrated vocal improvisers on the scene today. From a sultry traditional ballad to a contemporary jazz-funk groove, a high-flying swing, or scat-filled romp, Alexander delivers each style with a passion and love of music that comes across in each and every note, and with a style and grace that is truly her own.

John Hill

As a Jazz radio host, producer, program or music director for commercial and public Jazz radio stations, Chicago native John Hill has gained over 35 years of Jazz radio experience. His broadcast career started at Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee, where he was instrumental in putting their Jazz-formatted radio station on the air. Afterward he served Detroit's WJZZ as a staff announcer and Music Director for nearly a decade. John's next opportunity brought him back home to Chicago, programming the popular Jazz and Gospel-



formatted WBEE radio in suburban Harvey, serving Chicago's south side. Also broadcasting at Northern Illinois University's News and Blues-formatted WNIJ, John feels extremely fortunate to reprise the relationship with Jazz he describes as a calling. "Ever since, out of sheer curiosity, I bought an Ahmad Jamal LP from a neighborhood grocery store rack and discovered Jazz art, or

maybe it was first hearing Nancy Wilson during one of [legendary Chicago Jazz radio announcer] Daddy-O Daylie's shows...when the opportunity came to play this great music on the radio, it was really like the fulfillment of a dream. So now, joining the WFMT Jazz Network is both a privilege and a real pleasure," he said.

Dave Schwan

A broadcast journalist and program host for nearly 40 years, **Dave Schwan** has had a life-long fascination with the history of Jazz, American music and their contributions to the world. He believes that Jazz is a true art form and agrees with Duke Ellington's dictum: "If it sounds good, it is good." Thanks to musical family members at his Northwest Indiana childhood home, Dave has been around music all of his life, and was exposed to Jazz as early as age five. Dave has been associated with



Chicago's WFMT 98.7FM since 2010. In addition to being a musician himself, travel is one of his main interests and has taken him to all 50 states, Europe and Peru. Along with taking in the history of these places, Dave has always made a point to seek out their musical culture as well, something he believes never fails to enhance a journey anywhere in the world.

Leslie Keros

Born and raised in the Detroit area, Leslie Keros has been steeped in music since she can remember, taking classical piano lessons, singing in youth and adult choirs, and attending fine arts camp in the summer. She first heard jazz on the radio in her youth, and her love for the music continued after she moved to Chicago. She has hosted jazz and blues shows since 2000 at area radio stations, and, since 2017, she has learned to become "a morning person," hosting a weekday jazz program on 90.9 FM WDCB in Glen Ellyn, IL.

Jazz Network: Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Who are the hosts?

A: The hosts are <u>Dee Alexander</u>, <u>John Hill</u>, <u>Dave Schwan</u>, and <u>Leslie Keros</u>. You can read more about the hosts online, either by clicking on their names above, or by navigating to the <u>Jazz Network program page</u> on our website.

Q: What format and style of jazz do you play?

A: The hours are programmed largely in a mainstream jazz format with some excursions into other genres of jazz, from swing to The New Cool. Each host brings their own unique interests and experience to the Jazz Network; for example, Dee Alexander, as a performing jazz singer, will play more vocal tracks, while Leslie Keros features jazz works inspired by the Blues. You can always browse the <u>Jazz Network</u> playlist to see the variety of musical selections.

O: How much does the Jazz Network cost?

A: The Jazz Network is priced on a sliding scale where the more hours you take, the cheaper it is per hour. We are always happy to provide official or unofficial quotes, and interested stations are welcome to provide a few different schedule scenarios to get a sense of price. When determining price, we also take into account a station's specific circumstances (such as budget size, new station rates, funding situation, rate matching, etc.) in order to come up with the best solution for both parties. To give a rough sense of price, the upper limit for domestic FM broadcast (with no mitigating circumstances) is around \$7,500.00 per year. Don't hesitate to get in touch if you'd like to find out what the Jazz Network might cost for your station!

Q: Do you offer reduced rates for HD-only broadcasts?

A: Yes we do! HD rates for a station are determined with a number of factors (including circumstances mentioned above), but are priced at a fraction of the usual FM rates. Stations taking the Jazz Network for their FM signal are also allowed to use those same hours on their HD bands at no extra charge.

Q: Is it possible to have the hosts record custom liners, promos, etc.?

A: Absolutely! The Jazz Network hosts are always happy to voice promos, liners, shout-outs, pledge drive hand-offs, and more! Simply send the copy that you would like voiced (a preferred timeline is always helpful as well) to Estlin Usher, and he will be happy to send them along. Once recorded, we are happy to send them back via our FTP or any other online file delivery service.

Q: What is PRX?

A: PRX (the Public Radio eXchange) is an internet-based file delivery system designed to be an easy and flexible way for stations to receive programs. All of our series and specials are distributed on PRX, and the vast majority of stations use the SubAuto system to automatically send and ingest the programs into your schedule. PRX is free for WFMT Radio Network stations, and we have both a staff member on hand

to help answer technical questions. We also have a short line to PRX staff in the rare occasion that there are questions we can't answer, ensuring that any issues are taken care of quickly and efficiently.

Q: What is SubAuto?

A: SubAuto is the automatic distribution system on PRX that allows for a regularly scheduled delivery. The system asks for some technical information for your station, and once set up, the program files are automatically sent to an FTP according to your schedule with defined Cut Number IDs for each segment of each hour and day. Each Cut Number ID remains consistent from week to week, so you always have the same cut number for, say, Hour 0 on Mondays. This allows the files to be automatically ingested into your automation system, and once set up, will populate each day like clockwork! We are always happy to help answer any questions you may have, so please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Q: I need to cover more than 9 hours per day. What are my options?

A: We allow repeats of hours on a by-request basis. Many stations have come to us in the past few years looking to fill a 24-hour broadcast schedule for HD channels, and the Jazz Network can be an efficient and cost-effective solution. Stations airing the hours on a 24-hour cycle will frequently air all 9 hours, followed by repeating those same hours in a different order (to break hour-on-hour habituation). We also offer reduced or waived fees for our weekly series programming in these cases, to provide listeners with some variety.

Q: Is it possible to bundle Beethoven Network and Jazz Network, or other programs?

A: Absolutely! As a mission-driven, non-profit organization dedicated to supporting and celebrating Classical, Jazz, Folk, and all of the Fine Arts, we are always willing to work with you to bring these wonderful art forms to your listeners. We frequently bundle programs, offer deferred rates, and work out deals with stations that meet both of our needs. When in doubt, just reach out! We're here to be of service to you.

This series is available *free of charge to all affiliate stations* for one broadcast through **March 30**, 2022. This is a shortened air window due to rights restrictions.

The **Los Angeles Philharmonic**, under the vibrant leadership of Music & Artistic Director **Gustavo Dudamel**, presents an inspiring array of music through a commitment to foundational works and adventurous explorations. Both at home and abroad, the LA Phil – recognized as one of the world's outstanding orchestras – is leading the way in groundbreaking and diverse programming, on stage and in the community, that reflects the orchestra's artistry and demonstrates its vision. 2021/22 marks the orchestra's 103rd season.

More than 250 concerts are either performed or presented by the LA Phil at the Frank Gehry-designed Walt Disney Concert Hall and the famed Hollywood Bowl. 2020 marked the first year that the LA Phil operated The Ford, continuing the historic venue's



longstanding tradition of providing access to performance experiences representative of L.A. County's multifaceted communities. Collectively, the presentations at the LA Phil's three iconic venues represent a breadth and depth unrivaled by other orchestras or cultural institutions.

During its winter season, with approximately 165 performances at Walt Disney Concert Hall, the LA Phil creates festivals, artist residencies, and other thematic programs designed to enhance the audience's experience and delve further into artists' or composers' work. The organization's commitment to the music of our time is also evident throughout the season in the groundbreaking Green Umbrella series and the LA Phil's extensive commissioning initiatives. For its recent Centennial season (September 2018 through October 2019), the LA Phil invited people from Los Angeles and all around the world to join in a variety of celebrations, learning initiatives, artistic collaborations, and an unprecedented number of commissioned works, prompting the *Los Angeles Times* to hail, "No orchestra has been this ambitious, ever."

Since 2003, the LA Phil's winter home has been the inimitable Walt Disney Concert Hall. Praise for both the design and the acoustics of Walt Disney Concert Hall has been effusive, and the building embodies the energy, imagination, and creative spirit of the city of Los Angeles and its orchestra. As *Time* magazine noted, "With its curvaceous exterior and acoustically adroit interior, Gehry's building bestowed on the city an important architectural landmark and proved that L.A. residents actually do go to the symphony," while *The Washington Post* stated, "At last this orchestra has a hall worthy of its stature."

Since its official opening in 1922, the Hollywood Bowl has been the summer home of the Los Angeles Philharmonic. One of the largest natural amphitheaters in the world, with a seating capacity of nearly 18,000, the Hollywood Bowl plays host to the finest artists from all genres of music. The Hollywood Bowl has been named Best Major Outdoor Concert Venue 15 times by *Pollstar* and has been twice awarded the Top Amphitheater prize at the *Billboard* Live Music Awards. For millions of music lovers across Southern California, the Hollywood Bowl is synonymous with summer.

The Ford is one of the oldest performing arts venues in Los Angeles, with an outdoor 1,200-seat amphitheater and a rich history dating back to 1920. Situated in a 32-acre park and under the stewardship of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, The Ford presents an eclectic summer season of music, dance, film, and family events that are reflective of the communities that comprise Los Angeles.

The orchestra's involvement with Los Angeles extends beyond its venues, with performances in the schools, churches, and neighborhood centers of a vastly diverse community. Among its wide-ranging learning initiatives is YOLA (Youth Orchestra Los Angeles). Inspired by Venezuela's revolutionary El Sistema, the LA Phil and its community partners seek to democratize music education by offering free, high-quality instrumental music instruction in under-resourced neighborhoods across Los Angeles. Through YOLA National, the LA Phil extends its reach nationwide and celebrates the work that's done around the country by programs similar to YOLA and convenes young people each summer in Los Angeles at the YOLA National Festival. The Frank Gehry-designed Judith and Thomas L. Beckmen Center at Inglewood, YOLA's first permanent, purpose-built facility, will serve 500 students annually from the surrounding community while also providing a facility that can bring together students from existing and future YOLA venues when it opens in August 2021.

Always inspired to expand its cultural offerings, the LA Phil produces concerts each season at Walt Disney Concert Hall that features distinguished artists in recital, jazz, world music, songbook, and visiting orchestra performances, in addition to special holiday concerts and series of chamber music, organ recitals, and Baroque music.

The Los Angeles Philharmonic continues to broaden its audience by broadcasting concerts on radio and television. Thirteen concerts featuring performances from previous seasons and its acclaimed

SOUND/STAGE online concert-video series will be broadcast in partnership with Classical KUSC and the WFMT Radio Network.

The orchestra has a substantial catalog of concerts available online, including the first full-length classical music video released on iTunes. In November 2018, the Los Angeles Philharmonic and Music & Artistic Director Gustavo Dudamel released Tchaikovsky's *The Nutcracker* in partnership with Deutsche Grammophon. March 2019 saw the release of Esa-Pekka Salonen's Cello Concerto featuring Yo-Yo Ma and a live recording featuring Dudamel and the LA Phil performing the music of John Williams. For its Centennial, the LA Phil released a limited-edition, 32-CD and 3-DVD comprehensive box set. In August 2019, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, in partnership with Deutsche Grammophon, released the live, world premiere recording of Andrew Norman's *Sustain*, which won a GRAMMY® Award for Best Orchestral Performance. And in January 2021, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, in partnership with Deutsche Grammophon, released the CD edition of *Charles Ives: Complete Symphonies*, which garnered the orchestra a second-year-in-a-row GRAMMY® Award for Best Orchestral Performance.

The Los Angeles Philharmonic was founded by William Andrews Clark, Jr., a millionaire and amateur musician, who established it as the city's first permanent symphony orchestra in 1919. Walter Henry Rothwell became its first Music Director, serving until 1927; since then, 10 renowned conductors have served in that capacity:

Welcome to The Midnight Special, the enduring and beloved folk music radio program, syndicated through the WFMT Radio Network. The Midnight Special first aired in Chicago on WFMT-FM in 1953, and went national in 1971. Rich in tradition and history, the program has remained current through decades of change by retaining its topical bent while delighting listeners worldwide with gentle irreverence, touchingly candid observations, and the unveiling of new music.

The Midnight Special's host **Marilyn Rea Beyer** came aboard in September 2020. A seasoned broadcaster, educator, writer, poet and storyteller,

Marilyn was on-air midday host and music director for Boston's WUMB from 1994-2014. She has also taught speech communication and writing for the media, among her many pursuits. "I have loved *The Midnight Special* since my teens," she says, and relishes "the active listener engagement, the quirks and surprises, and the pursuit of fresh material that has made the show a radio legend."



In 1953, the late Mike Nichols, (then a WFMT announcer who went on to become one of the most respected stage and film directors), developed The Midnight Special as a showcase for recorded folk music. Over the years, The Midnight Special has evolved into an eclectic mixture of song and story that attracts not only a loyal following, but also new, younger listeners with each broadcast. They hear an incredibly diverse selection of artists, from the traditional to the contemporary: Pete Seeger and The Weavers, the New Lost City Ramblers, Joan Baez, Tom Paxton, Arlo Guthrie, Mike Cross, Ani DiFranco, Greg Brown, Alison Krauss and Anais Mitchell, to name a few, along with comedy from the likes of Bob Newhart and Mitchell & Webb. Material comes from an unrivaled library of over 13,000 CDs, 5,000 LPs and 55 years of live concert and studio recordings that began with Pete Seeger and Big Bill Broonzy in a concert that became a Folkways album. The Midnight Special often airs live performances recorded by WFMT over the past 60 years that are not available commercially, including well-known artists appearing at Chicago-area clubs, the University of Chicago Folk Festivals, and more.

Since its founding in 1959, the <u>Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra</u> (MSO) has continued to be one of the country's most artistically vibrant and innovative orchestras. This tradition has been enjoyed by millions nationwide since 1971 with the MSO's radio series – the country's longest-running national classical radio series. The MSO's full-time, professional, virtuosic musicians

excite listeners with over 140 live concerts across Wisconsin each season. A selection of these are heard on the orchestra's radio broadcasts, which feature exclusive behind the scenes and backstage musician commentary.



The MSO is a pioneer among American orchestras. The orchestra has performed world and American premieres of works by John Adams, Roberto Sierra, Phillip Glass, Geoffrey Gordon, Marc Neikrug, and Matthias Pintscher. In 2005, the MSO gained national recognition as the first American orchestra to offer live recordings on iTunes, and continues to offer over forty albums available for download.

In recent years, this has included award-winning profiles of former Music

Directors Lorin Maazel and Pierre Boulez plus in-depth examinations of monumental works, such as Mahler's Ninth Symphony and the *Turangalila-Symphonie* by Messiaen. Important themes that will be explored this season include a Mahler showcase, featuring performances of his symphonic

repertoire with fantastic guest conductors and soloists. You won't want to miss it!

In 2015, The New York Philharmonic This Week received the Grand Jury Prize at the New York Festivals International Broadcast Competition and it has consistently won top prizes (16 in the last two seasons alone) in categories that include Best Director, Best Sound, and Best Regularly Scheduled Music Program from The New York Festivals, the AVA Digital Awards, and the Hermes Creative Awards.

The New York Philharmonic's first live national radio broadcast took place on October 5, 1930, over the CBS radio network. On that Sunday, Erich Kleiber was on the podium leading the Orchestra at Carnegie Hall. Since that historic broadcast, the Philharmonic has enjoyed an almost continuous presence on national radio. Advancing its role as a media pioneer, the Philharmonic, since 2002, has shared its radio broadcasts with a worldwide audience through its website, nyphil.org. In 2004 the New York Philharmonic was the first major American orchestra to offer downloadable concerts, recorded live. Following on this innovation, in 2009 the Orchestra announced the first-ever subscription download series, Alan Gilbert: The Inaugural Season, available exclusively on iTunes, produced and distributed by the New York Philharmonic, and comprised of more than 50 works performed during the 2009-10 season. The self-produced iTunes Pass Series has continued each and every year since then. Since 1917 the Philharmonic has made nearly 2,000 recordings, with more than 500 currently available—including recent releases on Da Capo and Naxos featuring music of Carl Nielsen, Magnus Lindberg, and Christopher Rouse.

Broadcasts are available on the Philharmonic's website, <u>nyphil.org</u>, for a minimum of two weeks following the original uplink. Emmy and Golden-Globe Award-winning actor <u>Alec Baldwin</u> is the host of the program, New York Philharmonic Associate Director of Media <u>Mark Travis</u> is the writer and producer, and New York Philharmonic Audio Director <u>Lawrence Rock</u> is the engineer for the series.

On June 18, 2010, The New York Philharmonic was honored with two 2009-10 ASCAP Awards for Adventurous Programming at the League of American Orchestras' Annual Meeting at its 65th National Conference in Atlanta, Georgia. The Philharmonic received the Award for American Programming on Foreign Tours, and a First Place Award for Programming of Contemporary Music. The following year, the Philharmonic received the 2010-11 ASCAP Award for Adventurous Programming, winning first place in the Awards for Programming Contemporary Music. For 2012-13, the orchestra was again awarded the ASCAP Award for Adventurous Programming and the Leonard Bernstein Award for Educational Programming.

With the launch of the San Francisco Symphony's own SFS Media label in 2001, Michael Tilson Thomas and the Orchestra recorded all of Mahler's symphonies and songs for voice and orchestra. SFS Media records and releases audio and visual material reflecting the Orchestra and Michael Tilson Thomas' commitment to showcasing music by maverick composers as well as core classical masterworks. With a slate of recordings and releases of music by Harrison, Cowell, Varese, Bernstein, Beethoven, Ives and Copland, the Orchestra's recordings continue to reflect the broad range of programming that has been a hallmark of the MTT/SFS partnership.

SFS Media also releases documentary and live performance videos such as MTT and the SFS's national public television series and multimedia project *Keeping Score*, designed to make classical music more accessible to people of all ages and musical backgrounds, now available as digital downloads and on DVD and Blu-ray. *Keeping Score* includes an innovative website, www.keepingscore.org, live performance audio CDs, a radio broadcast series, and an education program for K-12 schools.

Founded in 1972, the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival is one of the world's leading performing arts festivals, earning both critical praise and dedicated audiences for its lasting commitment to tradition, artistic excellence, and vision. Our series reflects the Festival's high standards by offering a varied selection of superbly recorded concerts by the greatest of classical artists.

Each broadcast hour typically contains two or three full-length works representing chamber music's masterful repertoire. The Festival celebrates well-known core works, and remains dedicated to lesser-known composers and compositions, and to commissioning new works. These works come to life via a thoughtful mix of veteran performers and emerging artists.

The series host is long-time WFMT announcer Kerry Frumkin. Composer Marc Neikrug, the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival's artistic director, provides insightful commentary. Many musicians share their thoughts about their experiences at this remarkable Festival, and the music they've played here.



Here are some highlights your listeners will enjoy:

- With the concert cancellations in 2020 due to Covid-19, the 2021-22 syndication series features gems from the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival archives. This provides the opportunity to look ahead to the Festival's upcoming 50th anniversary by celebrating great performances of the past, and to honor three extraordinary musicians we lost in 2020: pianists Peter Serkin and Leon Fleisher, and cellist Lynn Harrell.
- Internationally acclaimed tenor Paul Appleby and rising guitarist Meng Su open the series with a song by John Dowland. Pianist Kirill Gerstein, violinist Martin Beaver, violist Tien-Hsin Cindy Wu, and cellist Peter Wiley bring it to a close with the Brahms Piano Quartet in G Minor. In between, we have a non-stop flow of gorgeous, core chamber music. For example: Vivaldi's Concerto in F Major for Three Violins, RV 551, with Jennifer Gilbert, Harvey de Sousa, and Soovin Kim as collaborating soloists; the Haydn String Quartet in D Minor, Op. 76, No. 2 with the stellar Miami String Quartet; Beethoven's String Quartet in C Major, Op. 59, No. 3, "Razumovsky", played by the magnificent Orion Quartet; and Schubert's Fantasy in C Major for Violin and Piano as interpreted with depth and poignancy by violinist Daniel Phillips and pianist Haochen Zhang.
- Pianist Marc-André Hamelin and the Johannes String Quartet deliver the emotional turmoil in Leo Ornstein's Opus 92 Piano Quintet, from 1927. Violinists Arnold Steinhardt & Ida Kavafian, violist Steve Tenenbom, and cellist Peter Wiley give a lively performance of Fritz Kreisler's charming String Quartet in A Minor. Pianist Jeremy Denk joins forces with the Tokyo String Quartet as they play the Elgar Piano Quintet in A Minor. Soprano Tony Arnold and a Festival ensemble perform Oliver Knussen's *Requiem: Songs for Sue*. Mezzo-soprano Christianne Stotijn sings a set of songs by Richard Strauss.
- And the music continues with Contrasts for Violin, Clarinet, and Piano by Béla Bartok (1938); the String Quartet No. 3, Op. 46 by Viktor Ullmann (1943); the Piano Trio, op. 24 by Mieczysław Weinberg (1945); Three Fragments for Flute & Harp by Witold Lutoslawski (1953); and a recording of the world premiere of a Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival co-commission, the Quartet for Oboe and Strings by Sean Shepherd (2011).

This program is a part of the WFMT Radio Network Opera Series, and is available *free of charge to all affiliate stations* for one broadcast per opera during the week in which it releases.

The WFMT Radio Network Opera Series is designed to complement the Metropolitan Opera Broadcasts, filling out the year. WFMT Radio Network Opera Series begins the week after the MET season ends, and ends the week before the MET's season begins (June 12, 2021 – November 27, 2021).

The WFMT Radio Network is pleased to announce the first batch of operas for the 2021 WFMT Radio Network Opera Series, beginning on June 12 and running through November 27, 2021. This first set of operas spans from June 12 through September 4 (with more to follow), and includes productions from Chicago, England, Sweden, and France, featuring exceptional casts and stunning performances.

Chicago's **Haymarket Opera Company** begins the 2021 Opera Series with a Handel Double-Bill: **Acis and Galatea** backed with Handel's secular oratorio **Apollo e Dafne**. Michael St. Peter, "a discovery" (Chicago Classical Review), returns to Haymarket to sing the role of Acis, while Chicago's own "bright, alluring soprano" (Chicago Tribune) Kimberly Jones is stunning as the sea nymph Galatea. In **Apollo e** Dafne, the dynamic duo of soprano Erica Schuller and baritone Ryan de Ryke bring vigor and talent to the roles of Daphne and Apollo in Handel's youthful masterpiece. Schuller's burnished soprano "easily wins our hearts with her infectious goodness, winning smile, and gorgeous tone" (Stage and Cinema) and De Ryke's "supple, refined baritone" (Chicago Classical Review) is the ultimate match for the virtuosic demands of Handel's Apollo.

Next up in the Opera Series is a slate of exceptional performances and beloved repertoire from the Royal Opera House. Puccini's Tosca receives the royal treatment, with Angela Gheorghiu in the title role, with Jonas Kaufmann as Cavaradossi, and Sir Bryn Terfel as Scarpia. Next, Verdi's grand opera **Les vêpres siciliennes** with Lianna Haroutounian as Hélène, Bryan Hymel in the role of Henri, supported by a gorgeous cast. And then, the all-time audience favorite of damnation and rapture, **Don Giovanni**, with Mariusz Kwiecien as the roguish lead, with Alex Esposito as his sidekick Leporello. Véronique Gens stars as Donna Elvira, with Malin Byström as Donna Anna. Next up is Wagner's legendary tale of song and love, both sacred and profane; Peter Seiffert commands the role of Tannhäuser, with Sophie Koch (Venus), Christian Gerhaher (Wolfram v Eschenbach), Stephen Milling (Hermann) and Emma Bell (his Niece), amongst a fabulous cast, all under the baton of Hartmut Haenchen. Another German great follows, with Richard Strauss' Der Rosenkavalier, starring the inimitable Renée Fleming as The Marschallin, Princess Marie Thérèse von Werdenberg, alongside an exceptional cast which includes Alice Coote, Sophie Bevan, Matthew Rose, and more. Royal Opera rounds out their suite of six operas with Shostakovich's Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk, with Eva-Maria Westbroek as Katerina Ismailova and Brandon Jovanovich as Sergey. Sir Antonio Pappano conducts the Orchestra and Chorus of the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden.

We're especially honored to bring two archival performances from Kungliga Operan (**Swedish Royal Opera**), with legends of the opera world in roles they sing best. Verdi's **Il Trovatore**, in performance here from 1960, stars Jussi Björling as Manrico, with Hjördis Schymberg in the role of Leonora, under the baton of Herbert Sandberg. Then, we return to Strauss for a seminal performance of **Elektra** from 1965, with Birgit Nilsson as Elektra—her first performance in the challenging and virtuosic role, which became one of the most acclaimed in her long and famous career.

Rounding out the first part of the Opera Series, a suite of performances from France. **Opéra de Paris** brings Massenet's opera comique **Manon**, with Pretty Yende in the title role, Benjamin Bernheim as Le Chevalier des Grieux, and Ludovic Tézier as Lescaut. Dan Ettinger conducts the Paris Opera Orchestra and Chorus. Next is Rubinstein's devilish tale of the struggle between Good and Evil, **The Demon**, with Nicolas Cavallier as the Demon, Evgenia Muraveva as Tamara, and Alexey Dolgov as Prince Sinodal. Here, the Orchestre National Bordeaux Aquitaine, Chorus of Opéra National de Bordeaux, and the chorus of Limoges Opera all perform magnificently under the baton of Paul Daniel at the **Grand Théâtre**, **Bordeaux**. Next, we return to Wagner with **l'Opéra du Capitole de Toulouse**'s exceptional rendition of **Parsifal**. Nikolai Schukoff stars in the title role, with Sophie Koch as Kundry, Peter Rose as Gurnemanz, and

Matthias Goerne as Amfortas. And finally, we return to the 18th century with Jean-Philippe Rameau's seminal and inspired work **Hippolyte et Aricie** produced by **Opéra Comique**. Reinoud Van Mechelen stars as Hippolyte, with Elsa Benoit as Aricie, supported by Stéphane Degout (Thésée), Eugénie Lefebvre (Diane), and more. Raphaël Pichon conducts the Pygmalion Ensemble and Chorus, with the exquisite sound of period instruments.

The Opera Series continues in September with a set of two operas from Opera Southwest; Rossini's Tancredi and Bottesini's fantastical Ali Baba, a work that was lost for over a century, later reconstructed by Opera Southwest's Artistic Director Anthony Barrese. A truly phenomenal piece of operatic history brought straight to listeners across the country!

Next up is **Debussy's** stunningly gorgeous **Pelléas et Mélisande**, presented here by **Rouen Normandy Opera**, starring Adèle Charvet as Mélisande and Huw Montague Rendall as Pelléas under the direction of Pierre Dumoussaud.

LA Opera returns to the opera series with three fantastic performances. First up is Mozart's The Clemency of Titus (La Clemenza di Tito), starring Russell Thomas as Titus, with support from Elizabeth DeShong (Sesto) and Janai Brugger (Servilia). Then, it is trouble on the high seas: an excellent production of Benjamin Britten's tale of humanity and misunderstood innocence Billy Budd. Closing out LA Opera's suite is the audience-favorite La bohème (Puccini), with Marina Costa-Jackson as Mimi, Saimir Pirgu as Rodolfo, and a wonderful cast of singers sure to delight listeners everywhere.

The 2021 WFMT Radio Network Opera Series begins with an exceptional double-bill of Handel: Acis and Galatea, and Apollo e Dafne, presented by Chicago's Haymarket Opera Company.

Haymarket launches its tenth anniversary season with one of Handel's most beloved and enduring works, *Acis and Galatea*. The shepherd Acis and the sea nymph Galatea are blissfully happy until the jealous cyclops Polyphemus catches sight of them. In a fit of rage he crushes Acis under a giant boulder, killing him and breaking Galatea's heart. She transforms her beloved shepherd into a stream so that she can splash in its waters for eternity. This compact masterpiece weds a colorful libretto to a

sublime score for ninety minutes of sheer musical bliss. Written for the virtuoso musicians of a English country estate, *Acis and Galatea* works its magic with only a handful of singers and a small chamber ensemble of essential instruments.



Michael St. Peter, "a discovery" (Chicago Classical Review), returns to Haymarket following his triumphant debut in Lampe's *The Dragon of Wantley* to sing the role of Acis. Chicago's own "bright, alluring soprano" (Chicago Tribune) Kimberly Jones returns to Haymarket as the sea nymph Galatea. David Govertsen will bring "height and a thrilling bass" (Chicago Stage Style) to the iconic role of the giant cyclops Polyphemus. Kaitlin Foley brings her "superb blend of vocal gleam and fiery dramatic involvement" (Chicago Classical Review) to the role of Damon. She is devoted to Apollo's sister Diana, the virgin goddess of the hunt. After a breathtaking chase, she escapes him by transforming into a laurel tree. In his deep grief he promises to keep the tree forever green with his tears and to crown heroes with its leaves. The astonishing beauty of Handel's music has made *Apollo e Dafne* one of his greatest hits.

The dynamic duo soprano **Erica Schuller** and baritone **Ryan de Ryke**, well-known to Haymarket audiences for their show-stopping performances in Telemann's *Pimpinone*, create the roles of Daphne and Apollo in Handel's youthful masterpiece. Schuller's burnished soprano "easily wins our hearts with her infectious goodness, winning smile, and gorgeous tone" (Stage and Cinema) and De Ryke's "supple, refined baritone" (Chicago Classical Review) is the ultimate match for the virtuosic demands of Handel's Apollo.

First up in Royal Swedish Opera's broadcasts is a 1960 live recording of Verdi's **II Trovatore** with the exceptional Jussi Bjorling in the role of Manrico under the direction of Herbert Sandberg. Following this classic, the Royal Swedish Opera presents Strauss' **Elektra**, starring Birgit Nilsson in the title role.

Some background and context for these broadcasts is below, courtesy of Radio Sweden:

Il Trovatore: This production of Il Trovatore was recorded at Jussi Björling's (1911-1960) last performance at the Royal Opera, the scene where he made his opera debut in 1930. This evening in 1960,



his counterpart was the legendary Hjördis Schymberg (1909-2008). Already in 1934 she sang with Björling in Puccini's La Bohème and they sang over 100 performances together over the years. But as said, this was the last. Manrico in Il Trovatore was one of Jussi Björling's parade roles. Kerstin Meyer, who was 17 years younger than Björling, sings the role of Manrico's mother Azucena. Hugo Hasslo also participates here, in the role of Count Luna.

Elektra: This production of Strauss' Elektra is from 1965 and stars three internationally active opera singers: Birgit Nilsson, Barbro Ericson (b.1930) and Berit Lindholm (b.1934). This is from the sensational Swedish premiere of Strauss' opera which was the first time Birgit Nilsson sang Elektra. This extremely demanding role became one of Nilsson's foremost and most acclaimed roles for the rest of her career. Birgit Nilsson made her last opera performance ever in Frankfurt in 1982 in the role of Elektra.

The prince Hippolyte loves Aricie, a beautiful prisoner devoted to Diana's cult. As King Theseus disappears in the underworld, Hippolyte asks his mother in law, Queen Phaedra, for help. Little does he know that Phaedra secretly loves him and wants to offer him her hand and throne in marriage. And who could imagine that Theseus would come back from Pluto's kingdom?



On the 1st of October 1733, a lyrical tragedy of such extraordinary intensity was created that changed the course of French music.

Hippolyte and Aricie was based on the Greek myth of Eurydice and the works of Racine. Inspired, Rameau, then an organist and little-known theorist in his fifties, thus produced his first opera. From then on, he ruled the music scene with his descriptive orchestral writing and inventive harmony, both always at the service of drama.

<u>Opera Southwest</u> has built a reputation among opera aficionados as an under-the-radar destination for exceptional performances of rarely performed operas. Two Opera Southwest productions feature in the 2021 WFMT Radio Network Opera Series – Rossini's **Tancredi**, and a production of Bottesini's **Ali Baba**. Music Director, conductor, and composer Anthony Barrese leads the group.

Tancredi, a Sicilian story of chivalry, honor, and tragic love was at one time the most popular opera in all of Europe. The story revolves around two powerful families, who, like the houses of Capulet and Montague, have a long-

standing feud. Against a backdrop of the ever-present threat of Saracen invasion, a complicated romance develops between the exiled solider Tancredi and the beautiful Amenaide. When Amenaide is sentenced to death for a treason she did not commit, a disguised Tancredi fights to defend both his love and home. One of Rossini's most flawlessly lyrical works, Tancredi showcases Rossini's supreme concern for pure beauty of vocal sound.

With a libretto based on "Alì Babà and the Forty Thieves," the well-known and lively story from *One Thousand and One Nights*, **Alì Babà** was composed by **Giovanni Bottesini**, an Italian composer and double bass virtuoso known as the "Paganini of the bass." The opera premiered in 1871 in London, receiving considerable acclaim and numerous performances. However, later the score was lost and the opera has not been heard in well over a century. Opera Southwest Artistic Director Anthony Barrese has reconstructed the score from the composer's original manuscript, and Opera Southwest has given the work its modern American premiere. Opera Southwest's production of Ali Baba was sponsored by the Brabson Library and Educational Foundation.

Opera Southwest (OSW) is Albuquerque's opera company and its mission is to produce quality, professional, enjoyable and accessible opera in an intimate setting for audiences of all ages. The company was founded in 1972 as Albuquerque Opera Theatre by Dr. Edward T. Peter, Maestro Kurt Frederick and others. The 2020-2021 season is Opera Southwest's 48th year of producing world-class opera in Albuquerque.

About the Host

Known for her "powerful, crystal-clear voice," **Kathlene Ritch** (Lohengrin) has sung with such noted ensembles as the New York Philharmonic, London Sinfonietta, and the Vienna Philharmonic. She made her solo debut at Lincoln Center with the American Symphony Orchestra in Listz's *Dante's Inferno*. With that same ensemble, she recorded a live concert version of *Die ägyptische Helena* as Hermione opposite Deborah Voigt's Helen. Kathlene's true passion, musical theater, has been a lifelong pursuit. Two of her career highlights were performing *Sweeney Todd* at Lincoln Center, and *Carousel* at Carnegie Hall. Kathlene lives in Santa Fe where she sings with the Santa Fe Desert Chorale, is the accompanist for the Santa Fe High School choral and musical theater programs, as well as cantor and children's choir director at the Church of the Holy Faith. The Vienna Opera House is a marvel, with a deep history that touches the very core of Austrian and European classical music. The structure of the opera house was planned by the Viennese architect August Sicard von Sicardsburg, while the inside was designed by interior decorator Eduard van der Nüll. It was also impacted by other major artists such as Moritz von Schwind,

who painted the frescoes in the foyer, and the famous "Zauberflöten" ("Magic Flute") series of frescoes on the veranda. Neither of the architects survived to see the opening of 'their' opera house: the sensitive van der Nüll committed suicide, and his friend Sicardsburg died of a stroke soon afterwards.

On May 25, 1869, the opera house solemnly opened with Mozart's DON JUAN in the presence of Emperor Franz Joseph and Empress Elisabeth. The popularity of the building grew under the artistic influence of the first directors: Franz von Dingelstedt, Johann Herbeck, Franz Jauner, and Wilhelm Jahn. The Vienna opera experienced its first high point under the direction of Gustav Mahler. He completely transformed the outdated performance system, increased the precision and timing of the performances, and also utilized the experience of other noteworthy artists, such as Alfred Roller, for the formation of new stage aesthetics.

Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg spent a lifetime championing her two passions: equal rights and classical music, often referencing the similarities between the courtroom and the concert hall.
